

Impact of the Federal Government on the Washington Economy

Dedicated federal employees serve the American public from coast to coast. The federal employees who live in work in Washington are part of the 85% of federal workers who live and work outside of the Washington D.C. area.

In 2024 there were an estimated 116,428 federal employees living in the state, representing 2.9% of the Washington civilian workforce, with an average salary of \$101,077.





