RE: Petition for Rulemaking on Agency Relocations

Dear Director Ahuja:

The National Treasury Employees Union (NTEU) writes in support of Democracy Forward's petition for rulemaking to OPM, filed on December 22, 2023, regarding agency relocations. NTEU urges OPM to act promptly on the petition, which would establish safeguards against ill-advised and inefficient agency relocations.

During the last administration, several agencies abruptly relocated important bureaus and offices. These were transparent efforts to gut the workforce. Those agencies failed to engage with employees or to follow other sound management practices in carrying out the relocations. The moves, unsurprisingly, led to a loss of staff, productivity, and efficiency. Employee morale was hurt, expertise was lost, and diversity was weakened.

These problems must not reoccur. The petition would establish important guardrails. Agencies would be required, for example, to engage with employees regarding potential relocations. Agencies would also be required to find that any move would not result in long-term

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vacancies or cause a significant reduction in skilled employees or diversity. These protective measures would help ensure that any relocations are not taken for improper reasons, such as undermining our civil service. Federal employees and the public deserve a stable, professional workforce.
